Year 4 Tree Planting at Goodwood

The children have been learning about the importance of looking after our environment and reducing our carbon footprint, so it was great to get involved in this project and help plant some Hazel and Oak trees. Despite close to freezing temperatures, we wrapped up warm and learnt how to plant the trees with help from the forestry team at Goodwood Estate. Everyone was amazed at how quickly over one hundred trees could be planted with the help of a class of busy children!





In Reception this half term our topic has been finding out 'What happens when I go to sleep?' We started the term learning about different bedtime routines that different people have before they go to bed. We also found out about all the wonderful workers who have to work during the night to keep everything going in the world. Lots of us knew somebody who had one of these jobs and we were very proud of them! We also enjoyed learning about nocturnal animals and even got to go on an adventure at Forest school to see the badger burrows, this was great fun! We got to do star baking with Miss White as part of our 'How to catch a star' story, which we thoroughly enjoyed. As it comes to the end of term we have been working hard learning all the songs for our Nativity, we can't wait for you to see it!



Year 6

What an interesting and varied term it has been!

Our topic Blood heart has a predominantly science focus. So we have had an amazing talk on the circulatory system by Dr McGlone via Zoom that meant it was accessible to children who were isolating at home and for those studying at school.

We created synthetic blood and studied the pioneering scientist Karl Landsteiner. Dissecting a heart was a 'heart- stopping moment' [excuse the pun]; all the children were interested in the weight and function of the heart. We have designed a stethoscope in DT and studied pattern and texture through abstract art (Howard Hodgkin's and Mark Rothko).

One of our proudest moments was planning the stalls for the Christmas Fair. We independently created our own stalls, worked in a team and raised £106 for the school! We have sold eggs to parents and staff and regularly check the chickens and take care of the younger children in the school. We have had a very productive term!





This topic, Class 3 have been looking at the wonderful world of food and how to keep healthy. We have made different and exciting snacks, from bread rolls to crumpet pizzas! Taste testing is our favourite part of making, we definitely have some budding Jamie Oliver's amongst the class. Making food had led us into thinking about the ways we can keep healthy. We have learnt about the human body, and how nutrients are an important part of keeping healthy. Unfortunately, sweets and chocolate do not form part of the eat well plate, and we should eat 5 vegetables per day to remain healthy. Alongside a healthy diet, exercise is important to remain healthy, we have been looking at our cardiovascular system and participating in circuit training activities.

In English, we looked at play scripts and what they are. We created our own scene to accompany 'A tune of lies'. The dialogue was brilliant and lots of expressive vocabulary was used between characters. We then moved onto looking at instructions and why they are needed. First, we looked at the structure of instructions, then created our own for the crumpet pizzas we made. After writing the instructions, it was time to look at adverts and how some adverts aren't always as honest as they seem. With our crumpet pizzas in mind, it was time to write the adverts for them. Some of the adverts were mouth-wateringly good, but not that honest with some children saying their pizza was the best in the world! Overall, we have enjoyed the topic of scrumdiddlyumptious (spelling this is a nightmare!) and can apply our knowledge to all the food we are going to eat at Christmas!

In Year 5 this term we have enjoyed learning about the Tudors and developing our skills as historians, writers, artists and musicians. We found out about the life of Henry VIII and wrote his biography, as well as a story set in his court (inspired by dressing-up and drama). We thought about the causes and consequences of Henry's 'Break from Rome', when he became head of the Church of England. By reading historical accounts, we investigated what happened to his second wife, Anne Boleyn. We debated whether we thought she really was guilty of the crime of treason and wrote persuasive letters from Anne to Henry. In Art, we looked at Tudor portrait artists and developed our own portrait drawing and painting skills. In Music, we learnt to sing and play the song 'Greensleeves' on the xylophones.

During Anti-Bullying Week and throughout the term, we have focused on being kind in our actions and words. We worked together to create posters for our classroom and to complete 100 random acts of kindness. Many of the class represented our school at athletics and football events and won an award for Best Sportsmanship. Mrs Black and Mrs Renouf are really proud of the children in Class 5 for their kind and positive behaviour.



Year 2s topic has been Land A'Hoy and as well as learning all about different countries, explorers and map reading, they had a Pirate Day. They learnt to sing the Wellerman Sea Shanty and performed this outside and played PE treasure finding games. They had a workshop and got to look inside a smugglers box.

In science the children have been looking at the different properties of materials and investigating which ball is the bounciest, which fabric stretch and which materials are rigid or flexible.
