
## **Faith Council visit Chichester Cathedral**

Children have really enjoyed this topic, where they have learned about the 1969 Moon landings and imagined themselves as Neil Armstrong, stepping on the Moon for the very first time. They also have been working on a special performance of a famous space-themed song, ready to share with parents at the forthcoming Fantastic Finish. In Science they have been learning about the effects of gravity of different sized objects, and also been investigating the insulating properties needed in space suits to keep astronauts alive. ## Year 2

Year 2 had a fantastic day last week on Pirate Day. They learnt all about real pirates and those in films. They found out about smugglers and what smugglers carried around in their cases and the sorts of things which were smuggled in our area. In the afternoon there were lot of clues to solve to find the treasure. They ended the day playing pirate games.



## Year R

We have had a lot of fun in Class R recently. After making a volcano in class, the children wanted to know what an erupting volcano looked like. We had lots of help from Mr Matcham (Henry's Dad) to make our volcano come to life and erupt. Mr Matcham produced and designed a system that would blow leaves and flour out the top of the volcano. He worked tirelessly, pumping enough air into a pipe to make enough pressure to blow out the leaves. The leaves were to replicate the rocks exploding and the flour to replicate the smoke. The children helped to pack leaves and flour into a fizzy drink's bottle and then attached it to flexible tubing so that Mr Matcham could pump air into the tubing. The children then crawled into the back of the volcano. The experiment was very successful, demonstrating to the children how the force of air pushed out the leaves high into the air. The children took turns to crawl into the back of the volcano and pointed the bottle full of leaves and flour into the top opening of the volcano. Forest School is always a magical time for the children. This week they were engaged in helping the trees to feel more comfortable after losing their leaves in the Autumn wind. The children suggested that decorating the trees with stars might help them to feel better. This was a great opportunity for the children to practice their fine motor skills whilst tying knots and manipulating the sticks and twigs into place.

Also a very good test of patience and perseverance!



Year 6

It has been a busy few weeks since November. The topic is Blood Heart and although we haven't had any trips this term, we have had two very interesting visits to the class: one from the paramedics and other from Dr Tania. The paramedics, Jo and Crystal, drove the ambulance into school, which involved everyone seeing the types of equipment held in there. They talked about the function of the heart and showed the life packs that measured the heartbeat and the oxygen levels in the blood. Lots of questions were asked including how the paramedics dealt with heart attacks and how to reduce the risks of heart disease. To reinforce the functions of the heart, Dr Tania discussed the strength of the heart and how it pumps oxygenated blood from the stronger left-side of the heart, through the aorta to the capillaries. Did you know that the pumping action of the heart over a 24 hour period, has the energy to power a truck for 20 miles?

Mrs Bastable donated a sheep heart with internal organs for the children to dissect. It was fascinating to see the direct connection of the blood vessels from the heart to the lungs. So far, it has been a term of scientific and biological discovery. We thank all the visitors and Mrs Bastable.


## GAS Maths Enrichment Morning 29 November 2017

Children from across the Goodwood Area Schools worked with Mr Jackson in mixed teams on a Lego Mathematics enrichment workshop. Here they were reasoning and solving problems to do with the length, height and cost of different sized Lego bricks. Children also had to use Dienes apparatus to build their answers and justify their thinking. The final Challenge was, using a set budget, to build the tallest free standing tower they could. Children had great fun, learnt a lot about the size of Lego pieces (such as: they do not measure whole centimetres in length) and collaborated really well within their teams.
